Weapons of Mass Preservation

The following article, written by Rev. Stephen Breen, in 1958, was published 17 years ago in a St. Gertrude bulletin by Bishop Dolan. Isn't it interesting how much more it applies in today's situation in the world and in the Church!

Heaven and hell are locked in mortal combat and the earth shakes from the shock of the encounter; but nobody feels it, nobody sees it, nobody hears it...nobody cares! Our love has become depersonalized and our thoughts have become stereotyped. Our industrial and mass-produced civilization is actually doing what its opponents have charged it would do: we are becoming dehumanized! We are not bad people, really, nor are we really good! We are mediocre. This is the tragedy! We have traded realities for illusions. There is no passion or fiery aspiration left in us. Our divine ideals have been taken away from us. Our disease is epidemic! Sixteen of the 19 civilizations that have decayed from the beginning of history until now, decayed from within. The conflict today is not for land or national rights, it is for the souls of men; a conflict between the absolute who is God-Man, and the absolute who is man-god: God Who became Man and man who has made himself god! The religion of the man-god is a new religion without a Cross, a liturgy without a world to come, a religion to destroy all religions. The forces of evil are united; the forces of good are divided. We cannot unite at the cost of truth, but what is needed is a unity of prayer. We may not be able to meet in the same pew, would to God that we could – but we can meet on our knees! To a faithless dead-locked world, Our Most Blessed Mother comes offering us a choice: death in life or life after death!

The suffering that awaits us is almost without limit. The Rosary and the Scapular are the tangible reminders of the promise of the Mother of God and the means through which she will save the world in the days ahead. Let us fortify ourselves wisely for the trials ahead by putting on her armament: the Scapular. Like the life preserver at sea, it is a type of spiritual "life insurance".

We desperately need the help of the Mother of God. Our Lady promised St. Dominic: "One day, through the Rosary and the Scapular, I will save the world". Consecrate yourself to the Immaculate Heart of Mary – wear the Scapular! The enrollment and wearing of the scapular is a penance in itself. It is the beginning of our act of reparation for all the evil we have thought or done and for all the good we have neglected to do. Every conversion is a matter of efficacious grace and apostolic activity. The grace is God's part, and the apostolic activity is our part!

<u>Prayer to St. Aloysius Gonzaga for Young Men</u>

O most glorious Saint Aloysius, who hast been honored by the Church with the fair title of "angelic youth," because of the life of utmost purity thou didst lead here on earth, I come before thy presence this day with all the devotion of my mind and heart. O perfect exemplar, kind and powerful patron of young men, how great is my need of thee! The world and the devil are trying to ensnare me; I am conscious of the arbor of my passions; I know full well the weakness of inconstancy of my age. Who shall be able to keep me safe if not thou, O Saint of angelic purity, the glory and honor, the loving protector of youth? To thee, therefore, I have recourse with all my soul, to thee I commit myself with all my heart. I hearby resolve, promise and desire to be especially devout toward thee, to glorify thee by imitating thy extraordinary virtues and in particular thy angelic purity, to copy thy example, and to promote devotion to thee among companions. O dear Saint Aloysius, do thou guard and defend me always, in order that, under thy protection and following thy example, I may one day be able to join with thee in seeing and praising my God forever in heaven. Prayer to St. Aloysius for Purity

O Saint Aloysius, adorned with angelical manners, although I am thy unworthy servant, I recommend to thee in an especial manner the chastity of my soul and body; I conjure thee, by thy angelical purity, to commend me to Jesus Christ, the spotless Lamb, and to His most holy Mother, the Virgin of virgins. Preserve me from every grievous sin; never suffer me to sully my soul with any impurity; whenever thou seest me in temptation or danger of sin, ward off from me every impure thought and affection, and awakening in me the remembrance of eternity and of Jesus crucified, imprint deeply in my heart the sentiment of the fear of God. Inflame me with divine love, in order that by imitating thee on earth, I may merit to enjoy God with thee in heaven. Amen.

(Indulgence of one hundred days to he gained once a day.)

Prayer to St. John the Baptist

O glorious Saint John the Baptist, greatest prophet among those born of woman, although thou wast sanctified in thy mother's womb and didst lead a most innocent life, nevertheless it was thy will to retire into the wilderness, there to devote thyself to the practice of austerity and penance; obtain for us of thy Lord the grace to be wholly detached, at least in our hearts, from earthly goods, and to practice Christian mortification with interior recollection and with the spirit of holy prayer.

O most zealous Apostle, who, without working any miracle on others, but solely by the example of thy life of penance and the power of thy word, didst draw after thee the multitudes, in order to dispose them to receive the Messias worthily and to listen to His heavenly doctrine; grant that it may be given unto us, by means of the example of a holy life and the exercise of every good work, to bring many souls to God, but above all those souls that are enveloped in the darkness of error and ignorance and are led astray by vice.
