This upcoming week has the Ember Days on Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday. Wednesday and Saturday are days of Fast and Partial Abstinence. Friday is a day of Fast and Full Abstinence. Fast is defined as one full meal and two small meals which do not add up to the size of the full meal. No food may be taken between meals. Meat may

only be taken by those fasting at the main meal unless it is a day of full abstinence (Friday). Catholics aged 21-59 inclusively are bound to fast. Partial and full abstinence binds all Catholics aged seven and older. Partial abstinence allows meat to be taken only once in the day at the primary meal of the day. Meat may not be eaten at all on days of full abstinence.

Gentral Role of Our Lady

Our salvation begins when an archangel speaks the name of Mary. To be Christian is to carry on that Annunciation unceasingly. Saint Louis de Montfort wrote that "the salvation of each individual is bound up with the Hail Mary." This prayer that names the holy name of the Mother of God "brought to a dry and barren world the Fruit of Life. It will cause the Word of God to take root in the soul and bring forth Jesus." The holy name of Mary bears such power because of the unique bond between Mother and Son. "When God sent His Son born of a woman, He instituted a once and for all order of salvation in which the union of Mother and Child stands at the center" (Fr. Romanus, OP). To accept the divine privilege of speaking the name of Mary is to participate in that saving union.

Seven Sorrows of Our Lady

- 1. Her grief upon hearing the words of Holy Simeon at the Presentation in the Temple: "And thine own soul a sword shall pierce."
- 2. Her anxiety for the life of her Divine Child during the Flight into Egypt.
- 3. Her grief of soul when losing Him for three long days.
- 4. Her anguish upon seeing Jesus bearing the heavy cross.
- 5. Her agony of soul as she stood at the Foot of the Cross beholding Him die.
- 6. Her sorrow upon receiving the lifeless Body of Jesus into her arms.

O brightly shining star of sanctity! splendour and boast of the Augustinian Order; our powerful protector, St. Nicholas, hear from heaven the prayers of your devoted clients.
