Note From Father

Dear Faithful,

I was trying to describe to people just how loud they are, but I think that it is something that does need to be experienced to understand. And you can't go anywhere without them trying to land on you. At least they don't bite or sting...I may not have left the house if they did.

I saw one of our parishioners walking around in the cloister the other day, intently looking around the ground. I asked him what he was searching for. He responded that he was looking for blue-eyed cicadas. Apparently, the cicadas, who have red eyes normally, occasionally have a rare mutation and created one with blue eyes.
